## Understanding the World

Why are there craters on the moon?

Mix 4 cups of flour and 1/2 cup of baby oil together and put in a pan or circular metal tray or cake pan. Drop the pebbles onto the pan and talk about the shapes that are left.

Talk about how the moon gets more craters from space rocks than Earth. Earth's atmosphere will burn most meteorites and asteroids before they come in contact with Earth's surface. The moon, however, does not have an atmosphere to protect it!
